ADAMS, KATE P., (ROBERTSON), Brechin/Laurencekirk

• Highland Dancer, Teacher and Adjudicator.

ADDISON (FREEMAN), ROBINA

- Gordon School of Dancing, Montrose
- Pupil of Dave Beattie Brechin.

ALLAN, ARCHIBALD, Musician, Forfar [1794 - 1831]

- Pianofortes tuned and violin taught, Forfar.
- Studied violin in Edinburgh. (MA&B Review 23/10/1813)
- Teacher of violin, composer and piano tuner.
- Pupil of Barclay Dun and Sandy Murray of Edinburgh.
- He studied piano tuning under Mr Drummond, Edinburgh).
- He played in Nathaniel Gow's band.
- He composed that fine slow air 'Miss Gray of Carse' & 'Captain George Hunter' [S&RPoA - MM]
- Died after being maltreated, by farm servants, going home from a Ball aged 37.

ALLAN, JAMES, Forfar [b. 17/10/1800 – d. 18/8/1877]

- Notable violinist and composer.
- Oldest son of George Allan.
- Cousin and pupil of Archie Allan, also Niel Gow.
- Son, James Steel Allan also excellent solo player.
- Jamie taught John Allardyce of Arbroath.
- Jamie's fiddle, which he bought from a farmer in Newtyle, was called "the shoe" because of its ugliness. It was supposedly made by Perry of Dublin.
- He was a great storyteller and had a 'genial and thoroughly unselfish disposition' (Forfar Herald 26.3.1915)
- Story of his life = Forfar Herald 26/3/1915
- A Concert was held in the Kinnaird Hall, Dundee in May 1869 and on that occasion several of his friends took part in the programme. His son James Steel Allan played a Solo that night which was greatly admired. He had another son Robert B Allan who was a grand player and was a teacher of the Violin in Glasgow. Jamie composed 'Miss Emily Smith'. [S&RPoA MM]

- Quotes about Jamie Allan abound: 'Look at that man Allan he's sending his bow across strings like a flail.'
- His grave stone is in Newmonthill Cemetery was erected 'by a few friends and admirers in recognition of his genial sociality and his rare musical genius.' His ashes are interred below.

ALLAN GEORGE, Forfar [b. 1770 – d. 1811]

- Violinist and composer.
- Father of the Famous Jamie Allan.
- He was an expert in Jig playing and composed: The Cross of Forfar; The Loch of Forfar; Grange Mill; Letham Hall; Miss Webster Maryhillocks; Edinburgh Castle Hornpipe. [S&RPoA MM]

ALLAN, THOMAS, [b. 1807 – d. 1851 (Dysart)]

- Forfar. Dancie (?) Violinist & composer.
- Went to Alex Hay (Snr) Fife, Anstruther.
- Brother of Archie Allan.
- Composer.
- Found dead at a dyke-side, Dysart.
- He composed: Robert Scott Junior; Milldens; The Souters of Guthrie; Miss Don of Balownie; The Inch Cape Bell Quadrilles. [S&RPoA MM]

ALLAN, WILLIAM, Forfar

- Violinist and composer.
- Thought to be Thomas Allan's father.
- Composed R Scott Senior, Milldens, and also Mrs Scott, Milldens.

• Playing for dancing Kingsmuir 1921 (FH 30/12/1921)

ALEXANDER, JOHN, Forfar

- Violinist and composer.
- Known as "Blind Jock".
- Contemporary and rival of Jamie Allan.
- Published 10 New Tunes composed and dedicated to Miss Ogilvy of Clova.

ALEXANDER, Mr ROBERT [d. 1865]

- Dancing and Deportment.
- Son of David Alexander and Ann Low (daughter of John Low, Brechin)
- Taught in Brechin and Montrose circa 1855/56.
- Address given as 2 Springbank, Aberdeen (1855).
- Music conductor for his own dance assemblies.
- Cousin of Messrs Lowe of Dundee and Arbroath (Brechin Advertiser 5/6/1855).
- Sometimes assisted by a Mr Guthrie, Broughty Ferry (Brechin Advertiser 5/6/1855).

ALLARDICE, JOHN, Arbroath [b. 1838 – d.?]

- Born 1838 (Guthrie)
- Violinist with widespread reputation throughout the north-east.
- Mr Allardice's String Band, Arbroath 1889 (5/9/1889 AH)

ANDERSON, David, [b. 1852 – d. 3/12/1907]

- Dancing Master, Dundee.
- Brought up at Liff, where he was instigated into the art of dancing.
- Champion Highland Dancer
- Died in the Dundee Royal Infirmary, 3.12.1907.
- Obituary Dundee Advertiser 4/12/1907.
- Classes, Volunteer Hall, with Misses Anderson (Broughty Ferry Guide 8/1/1892).

ANDERSON, Mr.

• Mr Anderson's ball in the Mason Hall, Laurencekirk (MA&B Rev. 9/11/1831).

ANDERSON, Peem, Forfar

• Clarinet player. Leader of Glamis Volunteer Band.

ARTHUR, Mattie,

- Highland Dance teacher, Dundee.
- Forfar Highland Games July 1901 Martha Arthur, Dundee got 3rd in Highland Fling (girls under 14) (FH 26/7/1901)
- Started as a teacher of Ballroom dancing for a Mr Blair in Dundee.
- Opened her own school at Cutler's Hall in Murraygate (building now gone).
- Classes grew and a branch school was set up in Broughty Ferry.
- Won a Cakewalk competition at People's Palace (later Theatre Royal) instigated by two American dancers performing at the time. 'Arthur and Hall' won the final. This is early 1900s.
- All info above from undated and partial newspaper cut.
- Her partner for the Cake Walk for many years was Tommy Elder . (AH 13/12/1976]
- She was the big name in Dundee in the 1920s.

BALFOUR, WILLIAM.

- Dancing master of Montrose.
- Practising under Mr Corbyn of Aberdeen (one of the first professional gentlemen in Scotland) (MA&B Rev 11/11/1824).
- Every branch of fashionable dancing (MA&B Rev 11/11/1824).
- Classes, Trades-Hall, Montrose new figures, Mazourkas, Gallopades, Continental dances, elegant Ballet. (MA&B Rev 26/8/1831)
- Classes Dancing, Callisthenics, and Deportment, Guild Hall, Arbroath, 1834 [Dancing Academy, Peterhead] (MA&B Review 28/3/1834)

BALFOUR, G.

- Dancing master of Montrose. (1821)
- Also taught in Peterhead, Arbroath Stonehaven and Bervie 1822/23.
- Opened school in Brechin 1821.
- Relationship between W. and G. not clear. Adverts do not state which one is which (MP).
- 1828 Teaching Laurencekirk.
- 1829 teaching Angel's Sword Dance and Quadrilles.

- Teacher of Dancing, Dundee.
- Born 9/4/1782 and baptised as Charles BEAN on 11 April 1782 in Perth. [Betty Soloff 12/4/1999]
- Composer, published sheet music 1) 'The following tunes are most resp. ded. to Maj.-Gen. McDonald by [C.B.]'. (1802); 2) 'Five new tunes composed by [C.B.]; 3) Five tunes composed by ... [C.B.] (1815); 4) 'Six Fav. Scottish Dances ...' (1819). [A MacFadyen 03/99].
- Dundee, Perth and Cupar Advertiser class notices and Balls in Dundee and Arbroath on the following dates 21/3/1806; 24/4/1807; 4/9/1807; 23/9/1808; 3/3/1816 (Mr Bayne) [A MacFadyen 03/99].
- Classes and Balls advertised in Montrose Review 26/6/1812; 7/12/1821; 14/11/1822 [A MacFadyen 03/99].

- Charles Bayne (name shown as Charles BYNE) married Susan Kyd, in the Canongate, Edinburgh, April 1806, they moved to Dundee where all their children were born [Betty Soloff 13/2/1999]
- Name included in Dundee Directory for 1809-1818. [Betty Soloff 13/2/1999]
- Dundee papers advertise him 2/9/1807; 6/10/1809; 27/4/1810; 27/4/1819; 28/4/1820; 22/9/1820 [Betty Soloff 13/2/1999]
- Daughter Isabella died 16/1/1816 aged 6.

- Formerly a mathematics teacher, played violin from the age of 8
- Angus Cameron Broadcasting Band
- Founded the Angus Strathspey and Reel Society in 1963
- Obituary FD 9/4/1989.

CAMERON GEORGE, Kirriemuir

- Violinist, younger brother of Will Cameron.
- In great demand to play at dances.

CAMERON, JIM, Kirriemuir (- d. 10/1974)

- Violinist, brother of Will and George.
- Very popular player for dances.

- Good teacher of music and published a few reels and jigs.

- Dancing teacher- Forfar, Brechin, Montrose & Arbroath, also piano tuner (circa 1811 1833 Montrose Review).
- Published Reels & Strathspey and CDs dedicated to Miss Russell of Blackball (MR 24/12/1811).

GRANT, NICOLA

• Highland Dancer, Kirriemuir. Taught by Wilma Tolmie. 1987 SOBHD World Juvenile Champion.

GUILD, Alexander, Forfar. [b. July 1852 - d. 21 April 1889]

- Teacher of dancing and taught classes in Dundee, Brechin, Montrose, Carnoustie, Lochee and Forfar during his 20 year career. Died from a severe liver complaint, aged 37, at his grandmothers house at Chapelpark, Forfar, leaving a family of nine children. Wife predeceased him. (Forfar Herald 22/4/1889)
- Death notice of Mr A Guild, in his 37th year. His wife had died earlier. They left 9 orphans. (FH 26/4/1889)
- Mr A Guild will resume dance classes, City Hall on Tuesday. [At the bottom of this notice address is Buckie.] (Brechin Advertiser 19/10/1880 p1)
- Pupils Dancing assembly, Reid Hall (FH 18/4/1884)
- Bachelor's Ball, Mr Guild's Quadrille Ball, Town Hall
- Mr A Guild's Juvenile Assembly will be held in the Reid hall, on Thurs 16th May and the Adult Assembly on Friday 17th, the former at 7.30 p.m. and the latter at 8.30 p.m.. Tickets 1/- each. (FH 10/5/1889)
- Mr & Miss Guild, teachers of dancing will resume classes carried on by their late father about the beginning of March. In addition to former clases a Private one for Children will be formed. (27 Victoria Road, Dundee) (FH 20/12/1889/1/1)

- Brought up in Arbroath by Dancie Williamson together with his brothers John and William.
- Died in Arbroath Infirmary 22nd August, 1966 aged 85.
- Played the violin, piano, cello, bass and organ and was well known dancing teacher.
- Got his grounding in music at the hands of his uncle 'Dancie' Williamson
- Started playing professionally at the age of 12
- Was an organist for 70 years and as such played in churches in Arbroath, Inverkeilor, Carnoustie, and Montrose
- Much sought after to play at weddings at which he estimated he had attended in the region of 1000. It was his distinction, also, to play again at golden weddings of couples he attended 50 years earlier.
- During the First World War he served in Royal Naval Air Service.
- In 1926 he joined the Arbroath Special Constabulary and remained on the active list for 25 years, gaining the long service medal with two bars.

- Sword dances, hornpipes, wreath dance, skipping rope dance, cake walk, Scotch steps and Highland reels (FR 9/1/1920)
- Mr Kydd performed step-dancing (FR 13/8/1920)
- Pupils performed Highland Fling, Delvinside, sword dance, Irish Jig, ladies' hornpipe, cake walk. Special request Mr Kydd danced a sailors' Hornpipe and a clog dance. (FH 10/5/1921)

LOW, DAVID, Brechin

Violinist of the old school.

Mr John Low, Teacher of Dancing, Brechin [c. 1765 - c. 1830]

- He was the son of a Freeman of the Burgh of Brechin and was admitted as a Master Shoemaker to the Incorporated Craft of Shoemaking in Brechin on 9th September 1785. In addition to his shoemaking trade, he was also a teacher of dancing. As was usual with other dancing teachers of the period, he probably provided his own music for his instruction by playing the fiddle and according to his son, Joseph Lowe, he was the composer of the well-known dance tune 'Rachel Rae.' [A MacFadyen, 1991]
- John Low married Ann Clark, also of Brechin, on 29th December 1786, and they took had a family of twelve children, all born in Brechin. [A MacFadyen, 1991]
- It was John Low's sons who added the 'e' in the spelling of their surname. [A MacFadyen, 1991]
- Known as Dancing Master of Marykirk. Violinist and composer of considerable repute. [Musical Scotland, p.104]

Ann Low, [b. 1787 – d. 1859]

- Born in Brechin in 1787, she was the eldest child of John and Ann Low
- Married David Alexander 1818 Brechin.
- Their son Robert Alexander (1818- 1865) and granddaughters, Sophia Jane and Ellen Euphemia Alexander, teachers of dancing in Aberdeen, Brechin and Montrose.
- Her son, Robert, had a Dancing Academy in Diamond Street, Aberdeen, from about 1845; his wife, Sophia, assisted him at the Academy. Following the death of his uncle, Robert Lowe, in 1853, Robert Alexander took over the summer season of teaching in Brechin and Montrose and the Misses Alexander continued with this teaching after the death of their father in March 1865.
- Their daughter Ann, teacher of music in Brechin. [A MacFadyen, 1991 & 2000]

Robert Lowe, [b. 1791 – d.1853]

- He was the eldest son, born in 1791. His obituary at the time of his death in June 1853 stated that he had been a teacher of dancing for the 'long period of six and forty years' and described him as a 'consummate teacher of his art.'
- He taught in Glasgow and undertook an annual summer season of teaching in the towns of Brechin, Arbroath, Montrose, and Forfar. He had an additional interest and skill in landscape painting.
- Robert Lowe married a widow, Jane Taylor (nee Scott), in 1832 and they had one son and three daughters. Robert died in Glasgow in June 1853 and his wife in March 1855; they were buried in Sighthill Cemetery, Glasgow.
- His daughter Ann, teacher of dancing in Glasgow, Edinburgh and Inverness, married in 1851 her cousin George Lowe. [A MacFadyen, 1991 & 2000]

John Lowe, [b. 1793 – d. 1839]

Composer and teacher of dancing in Elgin, Perth and Arbroath.

- He was the second son of John and Ann Low, born in 1793, and was a teacher of dancing in Methyen Street, Perth, from about 1820.
- He married Jane Duff of Arbroath, (daughter of Archibald Duff, composer, publisher and teacher of dancing in Montrose and Aberdeen) in September 1821 and they had a family of eight children, the last one born in 1836.
- According to an interview given in 1908, James Neill (1834-1920), a teacher of dancing in Forfar, stated that he had received instruction from John Lowe in Perth.
- Their sons John Charles, Robert and Alexander Duff Lowe, were teachers of dancing in Perth, Dundee, Liverpool, Birkenhead, York and Richmond.
- John and Jane Lowe were assisted at their Perth dancing Academy for a time by Thomas R Allan, brother of Archibald Allan, of Forfar, both celebrated composers and violin players in their day.

Robert Lowe, [b. 1828 - d. 1895]

• John and Jane Lowe's eldest son, Robert, born 1828, also became a professional teacher of dancing, first in Perth and later in Dundee. Robert married Margaret Sherriff of Kirkcaldy in 1859 and they had seven children. Their youngest child, Isabella, continued to teach dancing in Dundee after her father's death in 1895 and was still teaching there at the outbreak of the First World War. [A MacFadyen, 1991 & 2000]

Joseph Lowe, [b. 1796 – d. 1866]

- Joseph was the third son of John and Ann Low, born 18th December 1796. It is probable that Joseph taught dancing with his brother Robert in Glasgow from about 1821 to 1825; their classes were held in the Assembly Rooms, then located in Ingram Street, but now demolished. In 1822 the two brothers published in Glasgow the second edition of 'The Ball-Conductor.'
- From about 1825, Joseph Lowe had a Dancing Academy in Hanover Street, in New Town
 of Edinburgh. In 1839, he and his wife, who assisted him with the teaching, transferred
 their Academy to 52 Frederick Street, where for the 'accommodation and comfort of their
 Pupils, they had built Large and Well-Ventilated CLASSROOMS, with comfortable
 DRESSING ROOMS.'
- For almost forty years, Joseph Lowe visited Inverness each summer to teach dancing.
- He taught in Glasgow, Inverness, Edinburgh, Balmoral and Windsor.
- Published collections:
 - 1. Lowe's Collection of Reels, Strathspeys and Jigs (1844).
 - 2. Lowe's Selection of Popular Country Dances (1853)
 - 3. Lowe's Royal Collection of Reels, Strathspeys and Jigs (1860).
- Joseph Lowe was a renowned and accomplished fisherman. It is said he composed a number of fishing songs.
- Joseph Lowe died suddenly at North Berwick on 12th July 1866 at the age of sixty-nine, his wife having predeceased him at some time between 1841 and 1851.
- He married:
 - 1. 1821, Jean Stewart, Montrose.
 - 2. 1827, Jane McLachlan, Forres.
- 1831, Charlotte Coe Eagar (1803-1845), London teacher of dancing in Norwich, Great Yarmouth and Edinburgh and daughter of John Eagar. [See Euphemia Lowe]. [A MacFadyen, 1991 & 2000]
- His obituary said: "...those who have ever enjoyed a day on the river side with this keen angler and genial companion will never forget his merry laugh, his quaint stories, and his

- indomitable buoyancy of spirit. Mr. Lowe will be long remembered and regretted by a very wide circle of friends." [A MacFadyen, 1991 & 2000]
- Musical Scotland states: '.. that he originally apprenticed to a saddler, then joined his elder brother, Robert, as dancing teacher in Brechin. From thence he went to Inverness and met with much success there, being employed to give lessons by many of the gentry resident of that quarter. He was proficient, too, in wrestling and boxing, and also an enthusiastic salmon-fisher, and these accomplishments greatly helped to increase his popularity among the lairds, who would wager upon his head against some of their gillies on the one hand, and ask for some of his nicely-dressed flies on the other. When he went to Edinburgh an entire stranger he had much difficulty in obtaining a hall on account of having no security to give for the payment of rent; but Mr. R. Paterson (of Paterson & Roy) liking his appearance, generously became his security, and so enabled him to start in business. [It may be added that one of his sons, Mr R. Roy Paterson, afterwards married a daughter of Mr Lowe (see Euphemia Hannah Lowe)]. [Musical Scotland, Baptie, 1894].

• His collection of reels, strathspeys, etc., occupied six books, and was published at Edinburgh (1844-45). In his collection, however, he sometimes falls into mistakes with Captain S. Fraser, to whom he ascribes six pieces which Fraser does not claim, viz. – 'Inveraray Castle,' 'Urquhart Castle,' 'Darling Annie' (reel), 'The Scolding Wives of Abertarff' (reel), and two strathspeys, 'North of the Grampians.' And 'The Highlands of Banffshire.' [Musical Scotland, Baptie, 1894].

Some of Joseph Lowe's family:

1. George Lowe, [1822-1883]

- He was Joseph Lowe's eldest son born in Glasgow in 1822 to his first marriage.
 George Lowe's death certificate identifies Joseph as his father, but does not name his mother.
- Taught dancing in Glasgow, Edinburgh, Forfar and Inverness.
- On 25th December 1851, George Lowe married his cousin Anne, the daughter of Robert and Jane Lowe, in Glasgow and in that city they were professional teachers of dancing until about 1861 when they removed to the capital city. For many years their Dancing Academy was at 83 George Street, Edinburgh.
- Their son George William and daughter Annie Eliza Lowe, teachers of dancing in Edinburgh and Inverness.
- George Lowe died in 1883 and his wife in 1881. [A MacFadyen, 1991 & 2000]

George William Lowe [-1909]

George William, the eldest son of George and Anne Lowe, continued the Dancing Academy at 83 George Street, but in about 1891 moved to Atholl Place, Edinburgh. His wife, Isabella Taylor Lowe, assisted him with the teaching. George William Lowe died in Edinburgh in 1909 and his wife in 1954 at the age of 93. [A MacFadyen, 1991 & 2000]

George William and Isabella Lowe had a daughter **Eva** (Mrs. William Matheson Pearson) who also taught dancing and she died in Edinburgh in 1971. [A MacFadyen, 1991 & 2000]

2. Charlotte Ann Lowe [1833-1894]

Teacher of dancing in Edinburgh, Windsor and Balmoral. Married in 1867 to Frederick Hope Robson (Surgeon). Their son, Charles Hope Robson (1879-1927), Managing Director, Patersons 7 Co. Ltd. (Music Publishers) Edinburgh. He managed the Patersons Orchestral Concerts and was a founder of the Scottish Musical Magazine in 1919.

3. Euphemia Hannah Lowe [1834-1900]

Married in 1857 to Robert Roy Paterson (Paterson & Sons, Music Publishers). Their son R. E. Stirling Paterson (d. 1940) carried on the music publishing business.

4. Elizabeth Lowe [1835-1873]

Teacher of dancing in Edinburgh, Balmoral and Windsor.

5. Joseph Eagar Lowe [1836-?]

Teacher of dancing in Edinburgh, Dunedin and Melbourne. Married in 1858 to Mary Ann Grant, Inverness. Their son Joseph Eagar Lowe and daughter Charlotte (1862-1950) teachers of dancing in Christchurch (NZ).

- 7. Mary Martin Lowe, b. 1839
- 8. Robert Whitington Lowe, b. 1841
- 9. John Clark Lowe, b. 1843

James S. Lowe, [b. 1798 – d. 1867]

• He was the fourth son of John and Ann Low, born in 1798. Little is known about him. About 1830 he was living in the Nethergate, Dundee, and taught dancing in the Caledonian Hall, Thistle Street. Also taught in Fife. [A MacFadyen, 1991 & 2000]

Euphemia Lowe, [b. 1800 - d. 1872]

- Teacher of music in Edinburgh. Married in 1839 to John Eager, teacher of music, dancing and fencing in Norwich and Great Yarmouth and teacher of music in Edinburgh from 1833.
- John Eagar's grandson was Frederick W. Bridgman (1833-1892), teacher of music in Edinburgh and a celebrated concert pianist an accompanist in Edinburgh and Glasgow.

- Braemar Gathering competitor, innovator, commentator and dancing judge for over 60 years. Honoured in 1982 by the Queen for his 60 years association. (Arbroath Herald 15/3/1991)

PETER, David McGregor

- Violinist and Dancing master around Esk area. Careston/Tannadice area.
- Taught mainly in Brechin in 1828-1833.
- Fashionable dancing advertised Montrose Review 1830 (June/July) Mazurkas, Gallopades, Circassian Circles etc
- A teacher of dancing, historian and heraldist was reputedly a Careston man but Tannadice was a favourite rendezvous.
- He reputedly traversed Angus by the banks of the Esk for around 50 years. Many remembered him as a man of measured step, always deep in thought. His black suit was well weathered and he carried a blue cotton umbrella under one arm and his fiddle under the other.
- Mr Peter was renowned for his diligence in literary and antiquarian research and in seeking out ballads, legends and ghost stories throughout Forfarshire and the Glens.
- He published a book called Baronage of Angus and Mearns (printed 1851).
- Mr Peter reputedly continued to teach dancing even when he was unable to take the floor and tried to teach from a chair, shuffling his feet on the floor.
- Mr Peters begs to announce.....inhabitants of Brechin....will re-open his School in Gardener's Lodge, on Monday 12 May at 12 noon. (MA&B Rev. 2/5/1828)
- Re-opening his School for two months in the Mason Lodge on Thursday 24th June at 5 p.m. he teaches Mazurkas, Gallopades, Circassian Circles etc. (#) (MA&B Rev. 18/6/1830)
- Postponing the re-opening of his classes till Thursday, 22nd.....in Mason Lodge, for two months. Mr Peter's New Music will be published speedily. (#) (MA&B Rev. 23/6/1830)
- Mr Peter's ball, at Ballownie, Brechin, on Thursday was a lively exhibition of mirth blended with instruction......the music was performed by Messrs Allan and Navie of Forfar.....the ball concluded to the entire satisfaction of Mr P's numerous employers in this quarter. (#)(MA&B Rev. 2/12/1831)
- Mr D. M Peters ball took place in the Town Hall on Tuesday last.".....pupils performed their tasks uncommonly well" (MA&B Rev. 29/3/1833)

PETRIE Robert, Kirkmichael, Perthshire [b. 1767 – d. 1830]

- Violinist, teacher, composer.
- Much patronised by nobility of N. E. Scotland
- Assisted by John Fleming (cello) also from Kirkmichael, he played at many concerts and balls

PIRIE, Johnnie, [b. 1875 - d. 1947]

• Aberdeen. Highland Dance teacher

- Settled in Newtyle in 1894.
- Had 2 sons and 2 daughters who became his orchestra.
- Judged Glenisla and Braemar Games dancing.

- His orchestra travelled as far as Liverpool and London.
- Taught dancing at the St Andrew's Summer School
- He died at a dance in the Airlie Arms at Kirriemuir.
